How long do the online modules take to complete?

We anticipate the online modules will take ACPT trainees eight hours to complete. This can be completed in one day or in small chunks over a period of time.

How much supervision does the ACPT trainee require?

As part of their training, each pharmacy technician undertaking the ACPT programme must final accuracy check 1000 dispensed items, and these must be double-checked by a pharmacist or qualified ACPT.

There are three check-in points and a final sign-off meeting with the educational supervisor.

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Our ACPT programme is designed to equip pharmacy technicians with the knowledge, skills and behaviours to safely and effectively undertake the final accuracy check of dispensed items.

The pilot is currently available to pharmacy technicians working in London, Kent, Surrey and Sussex, and applications are being accepted now.
